<i>435,000 Hungarian Jews were sent to their death at Auschwitz.</i>	<i>I remember seeing pictures from Auschwitz when we went to the Holocaust museum.</i>
<i>Wallenberg developed counterfiet passports and established shelters and safe houses.</i>	<i>I wonder how the Nazi's didn't figure out that the passports were fake?</i>
<i>In freezing rain, 27,000 people were marched from Budapest to trains bound for death camps.</i>	<i>This is a really vivid image. I can imagine the people walking in rows, covered with mud and knowing that they were headed for death.</i>
<i>Wallenberg appeared at the side of the Jews, riding up and down, distributing food, medicine, and clothing, and filling in blank passports.</i>	<i>His actions saved many more Jews. I wonder though, why the Nazi's allowed him to do this?</i>
<i>When the Russians entered Hungary, Wallenberg was no where to be found. In 1957, a report said that he died in prison. Rumors circulate that he is still alive.</i>	<i>I don't understand why the Russians put him in prison.</i>
